## **Medicines for Type 2 Diabetes**

There are many types of diabetes medicine. Each one works in a different way to help manage blood sugar.

## Learn about your diabetes medicines

Some of the medicines commonly prescribed for people who have type 2 diabetes are listed below. Talk to your healthcare provider about which types of medicine you are taking, why you are taking medicine, how much to take (dose), and when to take them. Ask your provider if you are taking your medicines correctly.

Use this chart to check off the types of diabetes medicine you take. Write in the name, dose, and when to take the medicine.

This list does not include all of the medicines prescribed for people with type 2 diabetes. Your provider may recommend other medicines that are not on this list.

TYPE OF MEDICINE	ABOUT THE MEDICINE
☐ Alpha-glucosidase inhibitors  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Blocks or slows the breakdown of some starchy foods (such as bread and pasta) in your intestines. This helps keep your blood sugar from going too high after meals</li> <li>Should be taken with the first bite of each main meal</li> </ul>
Amylin mimetics  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps keep your blood sugar from going too high after meals by helping food move more slowly through the stomach</li> <li>Helps keep your liver from releasing stored sugar into the blood</li> <li>May help make you feel less hungry</li> </ul>
☐ Biguanides  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps lower the amount of sugar your liver makes</li> <li>Helps make the body more sensitive to insulin</li> </ul>
□ DPP-4 inhibitors (dipeptidyl peptidase-4 inhibitors)  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps your pancreas release more insulin when your body needs it, especially after a meal</li> <li>Helps keep your liver from releasing sugar into the blood</li> </ul>

☐ Glucagon-like peptide (GLP)-1 receptor agonists  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps your pancreas release more insulin when your body needs it</li> <li>Helps keep your liver from releasing sugar into the blood</li> <li>Helps food move more slowly through the stomach</li> </ul>
☐ Insulin  My insulin  Dose  When to take  My insulin  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>There are different kinds of insulin that work at different speeds. They include:         <ul> <li>Rapid-acting insulin</li> <li>Short-acting insulin</li> <li>Intermediate-acting insulin</li> <li>Long-acting insulin</li> </ul> </li> <li>Some people take two or more types of insulin</li> </ul>
☐ Meglitinides  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps your pancreas release more insulin right after meals</li> <li>Should be taken before each of your three main meals</li> </ul>
□ Sulfonylureas  My medicine  Dose  When to take	Helps your pancreas release more insulin
☐ Thiazolidinediones (TZDs)  My medicine  Dose  When to take	<ul> <li>Helps insulin work better in the muscle and fat</li> <li>Helps lower the amount of sugar your liver makes</li> </ul>

## More information about diabetes medicines

- Ask your provider about common side effects
- Over time, your provider may ask you to take more of the same medicine, change your medicine to a new one, or add another medicine
- Write down your questions about your medicine and talk with your provider:
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Do not start or stop taking any medicine without talking to your healthcare provider first.
